A Star on the Rise: Solange Knowles

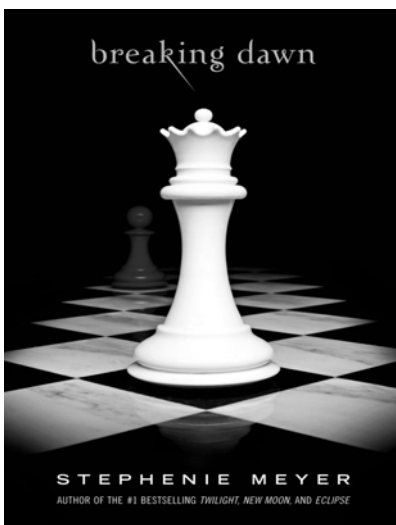

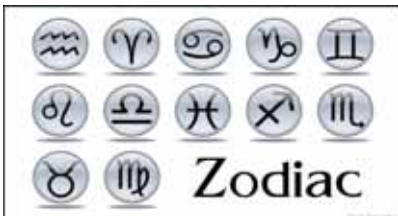
